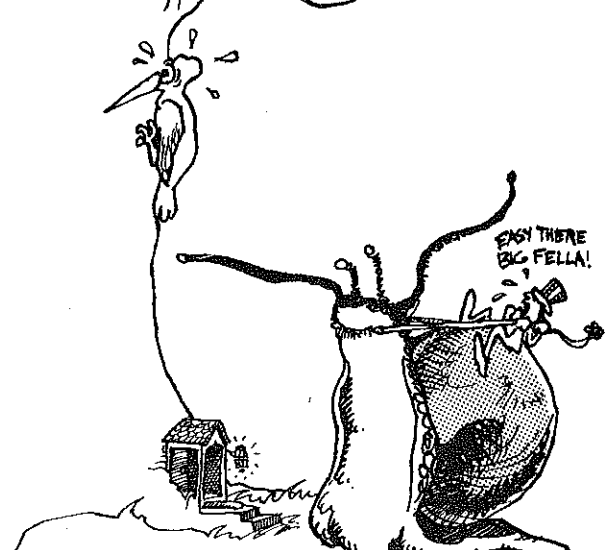

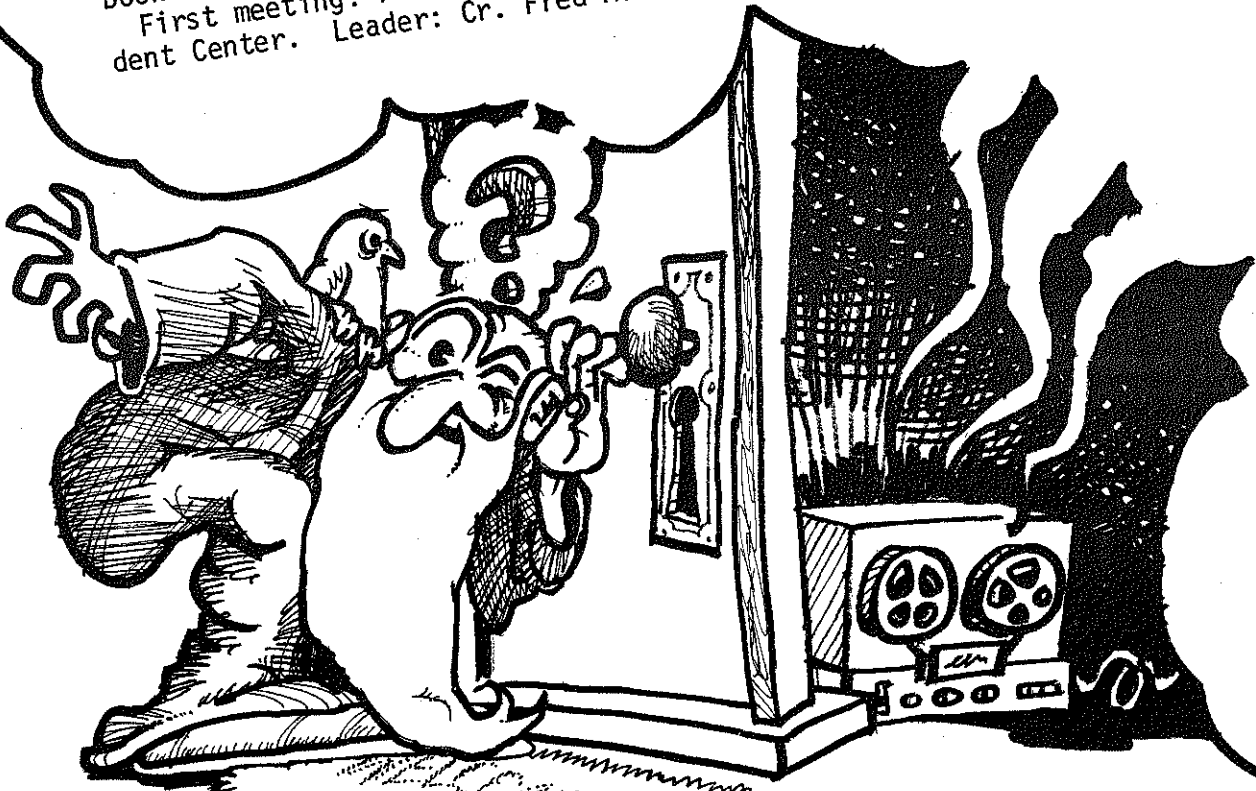
HONEST TO GOD

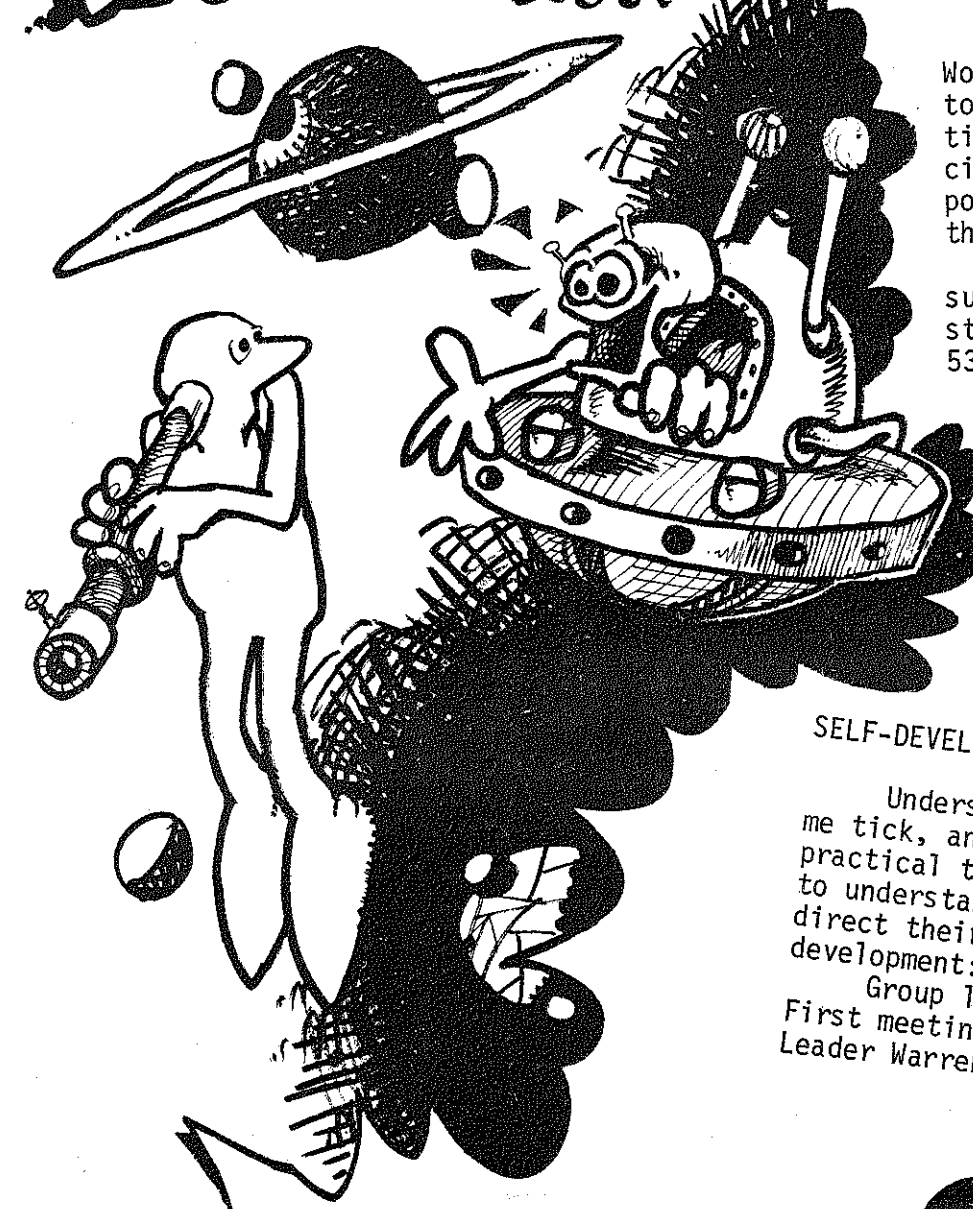

ENGLISH HORSEMEN GROUP

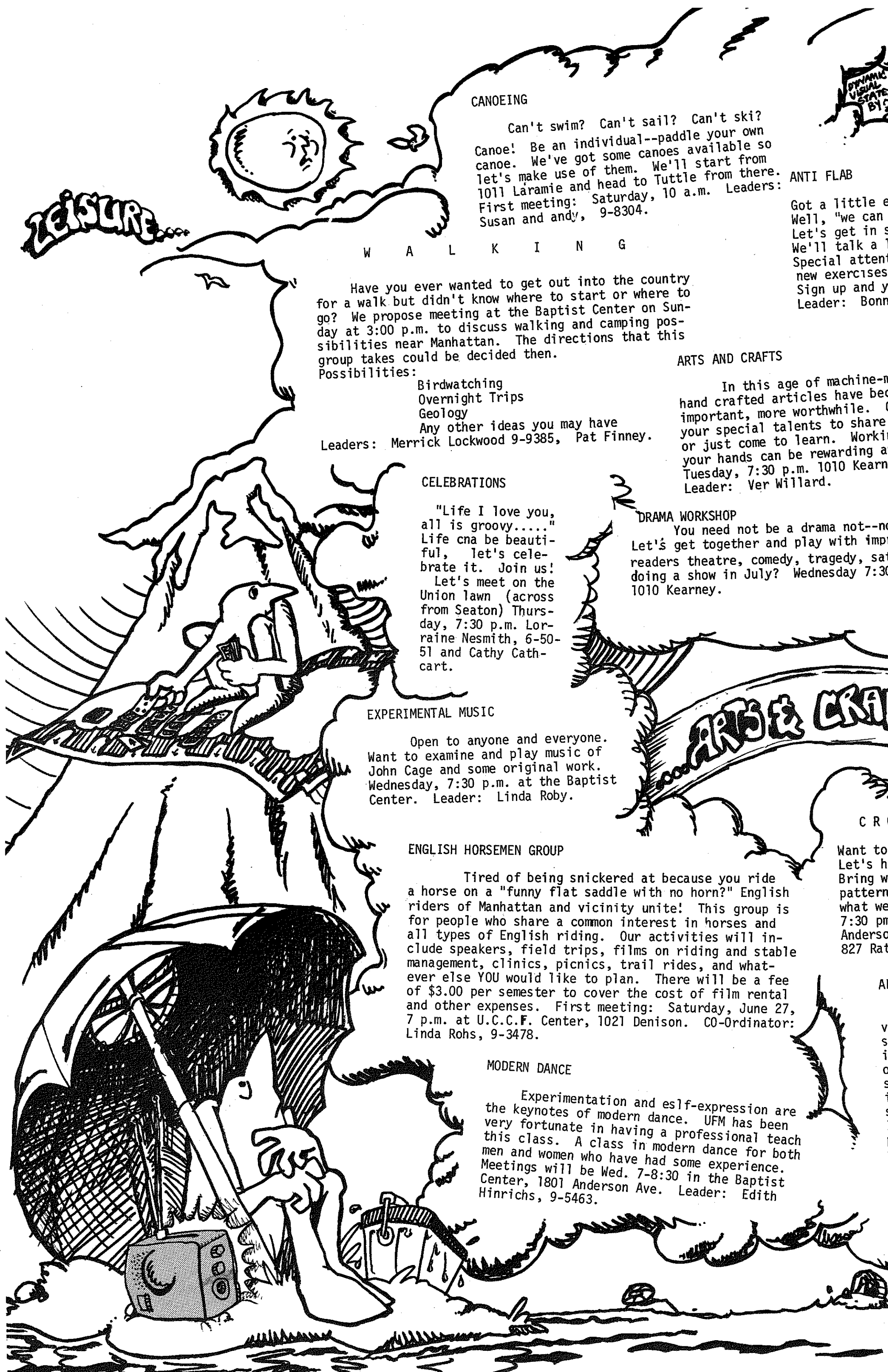

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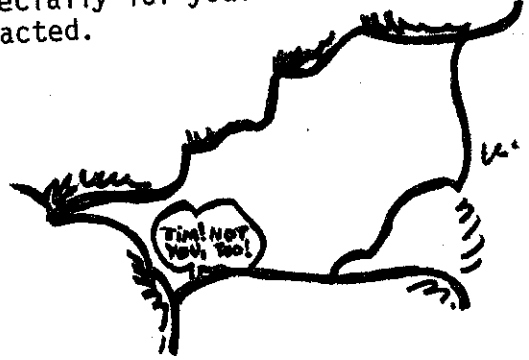
MODERN DANCE

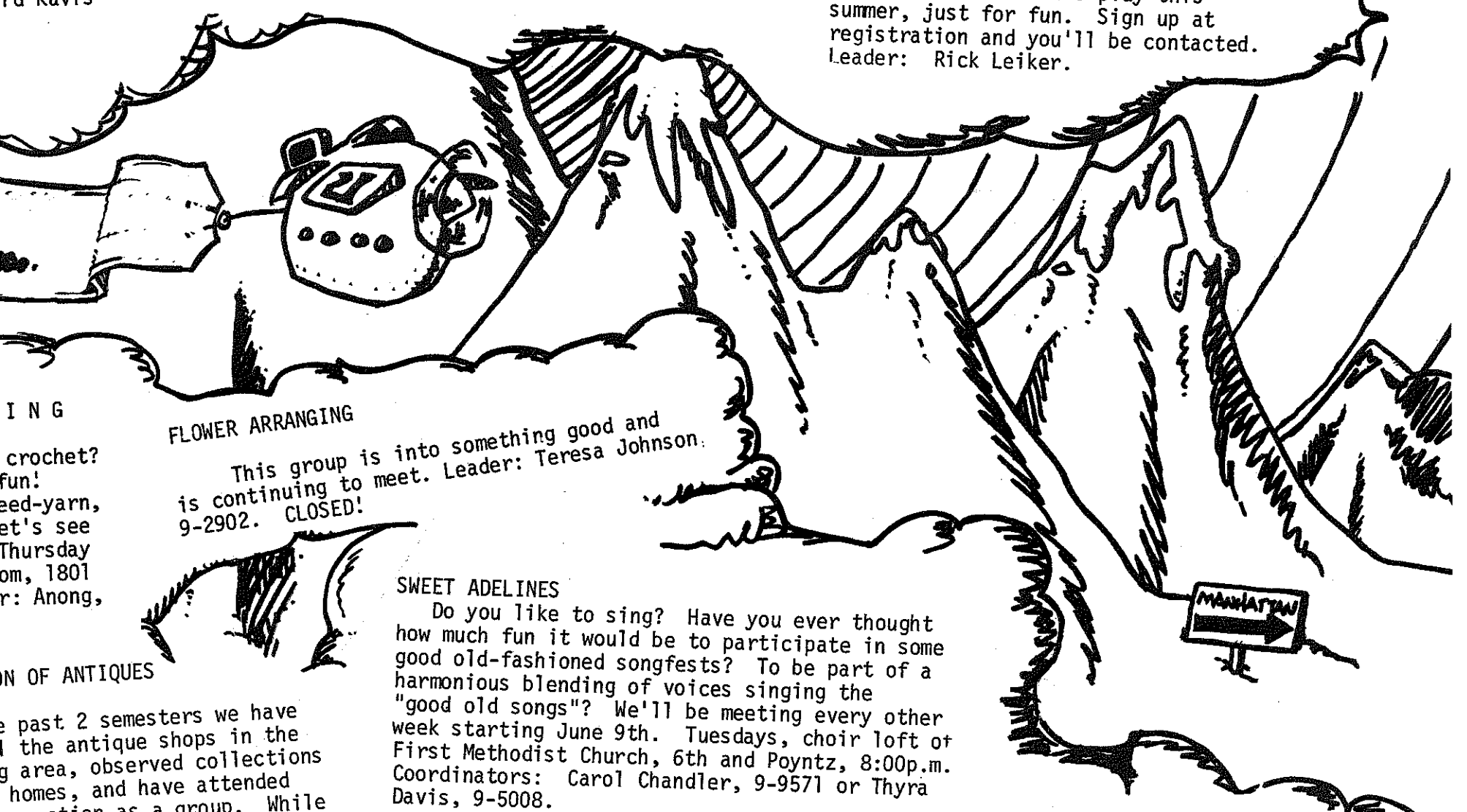

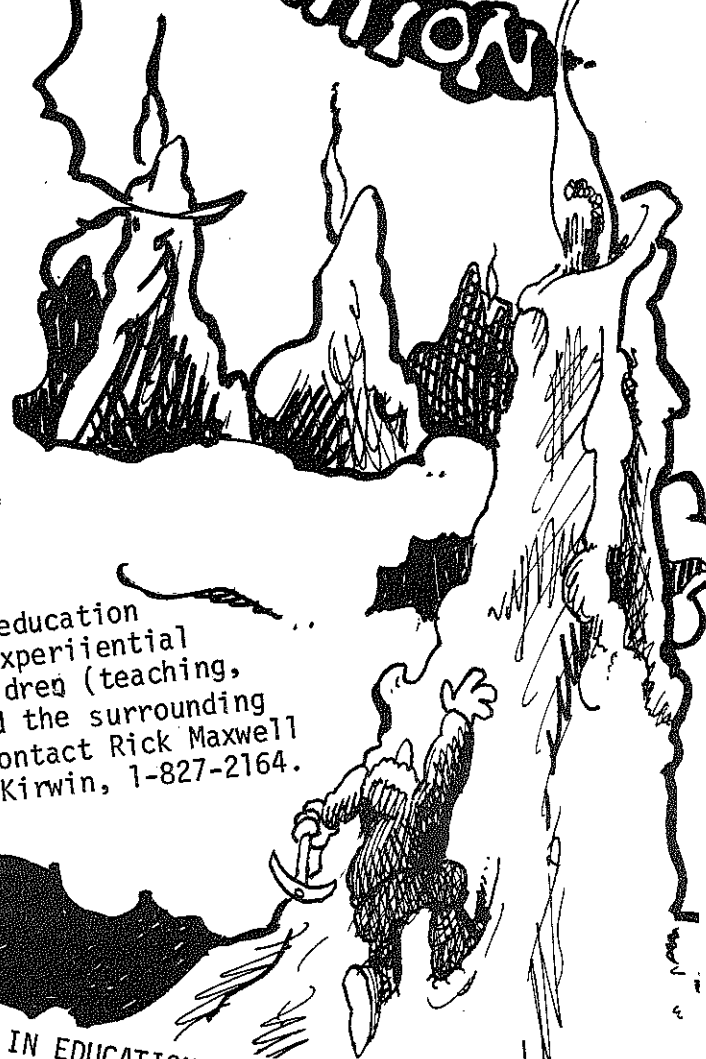
OUR HIGH SCHOOLS ARE DEAD

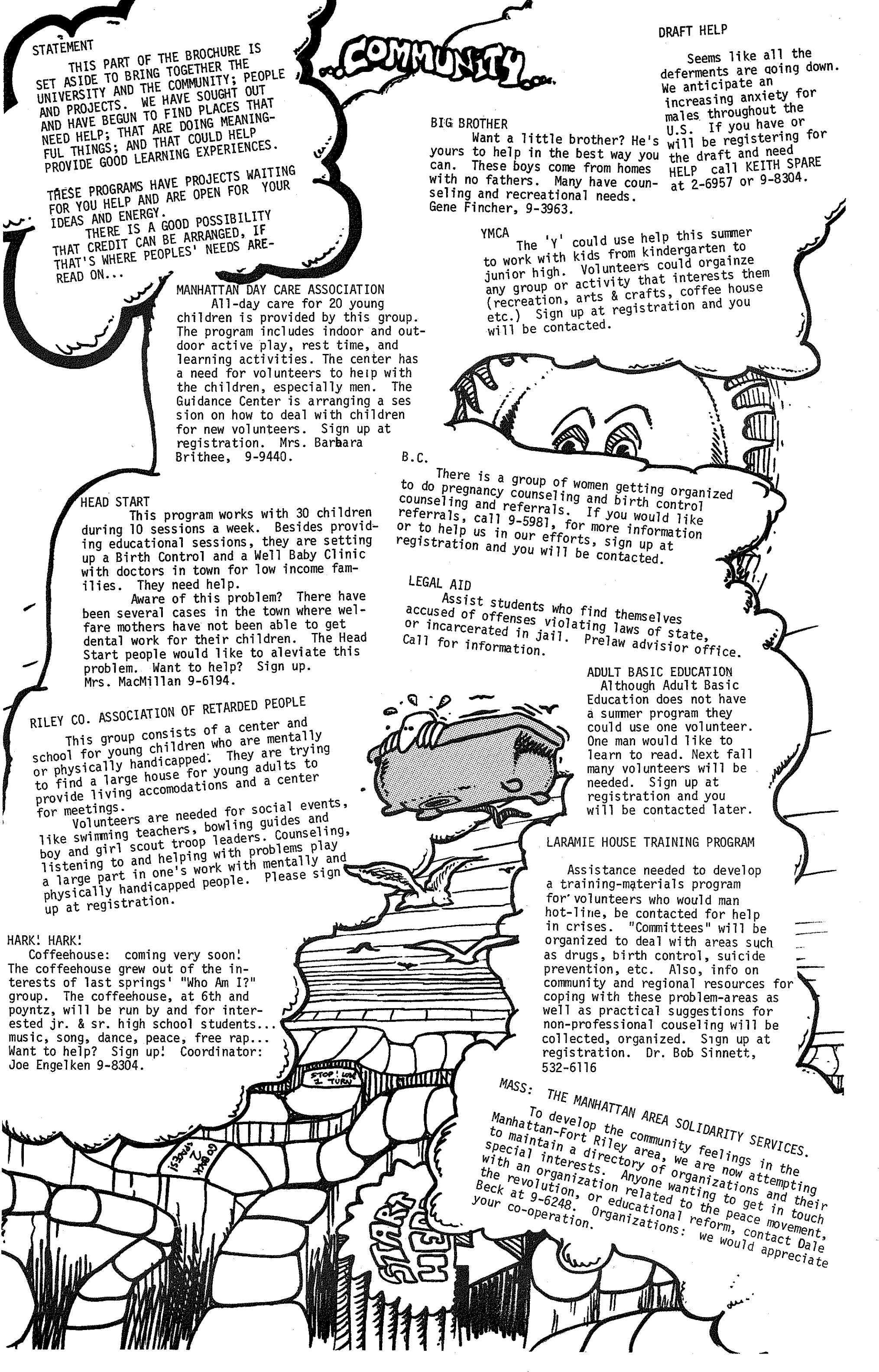

ADMINISTRATION

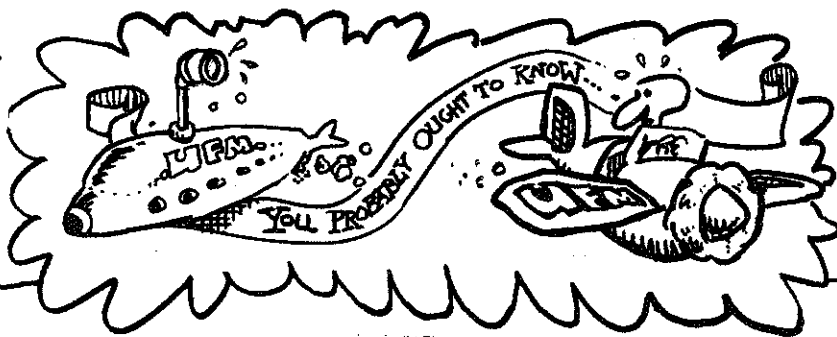

THE OFFICE

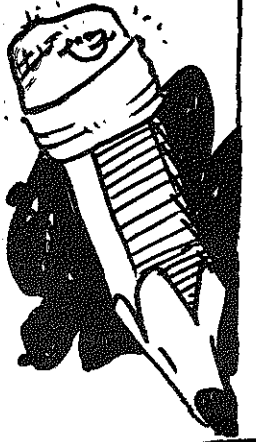

SPEED READING (reading time--.2 sec.)

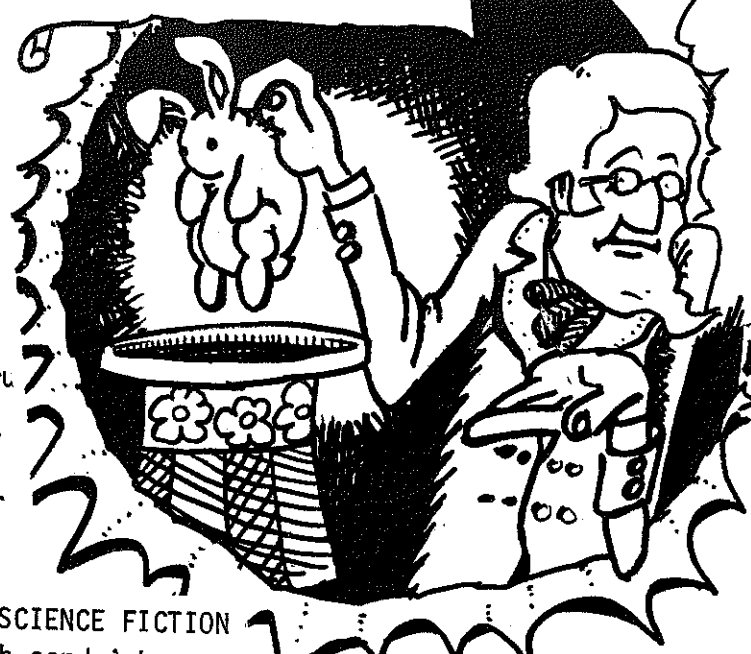
