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The staff at University for Man and the Manhattan Regional Humanities Council are pleased to announce the following special program made possible by two project grants recently awarded by the Kansas Committee for the Humanities (KCH). The KCH is an independent group of citizens working in cooperation with the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), a federal agency created by Congress in 1965 and supported by public appropriations and private contributions. The Kansas committee receives its funds from the NEH and regrants them to support humanities programs throughout the state. Our program has grown out of the Committee's theme for 1973-1974, "Kansas in Transition: Human Dimensions of Community Development."

Kansas is becoming increasingly urbanized and less identifiable as rural society. This is partly the result of government policies designed to encourage urban and economic growth. While there is little question about the desirability of economic well-being, it is in the interest of all Kansans to consider the effects of such policies on the overall quality of life in our communities. In short, we must consider the ability of government to respond humanely and effectively to the problems created by the growing complexity of our society.

This program is concerned with public issues of interest to Kansans in general and Manhattan residents in particular. It brings together the perspectives of scholars in the humanities and other disciplines with those of governmental officials and civic leaders. We offer it in the spirit of public-issue understanding, the first step in public-issue solving.

GRASSROOTS ALTERNATIVES CONFERENCE

Back in the 1960's when education was still working under the rubric of traditional conformity, there was a quiet revolution going on within the change agents of innovative education. In communities all over the country, school began to diversify not only methods of teaching, but also the school system itself. They began to offer students, teachers, and parents an opportunity to choose among alternative learning options. A diverse array of new schools sprang up. As the media caught on, alternative schools became "vogue." Now in the 1970's almost every major city offers several educational options either within the system, or outside of it. University for Man and Education Council of the College of Education at KSU would like to give you an opportunity to talk with some of these alternative schools and participate in workshops concerned with alternative methods of teaching. Though there is still much to be added, the program is as follows. We are encouraging suggestions from you!

SCHOOLS THAT ARE COMING:

New School, Omaha, Nebraska (free school) It's academic model consists of several methods: "individualized instruction, the discovery method, and the open curriculum." In truth, though, we are learning to live together.

St. Andrews, Abilene (open classroom) A Catholic grade school. The system is non-graded. Children can pass from level to level, regardless of age. Children are able to work together and live in an environment which is more realistic to their growth.

Yarrow, Lawrence (free school) An alternative high school, Yarrow is fairly new and started in August of 1972. A major aspect of the school is that there are community meetings which include parents, students, and volunteers that make decisions concerning the school.

Lorien, Lawrence (free school) Ages 5-12. The school is quite active, as it is open full time during the school year and two months in summer.

We're hoping for four other schools from Missouri and Kansas, but haven't received definite commitments yet.

THE POTTER'S WHEEL+++DARKROOM+++WOOD LATHE

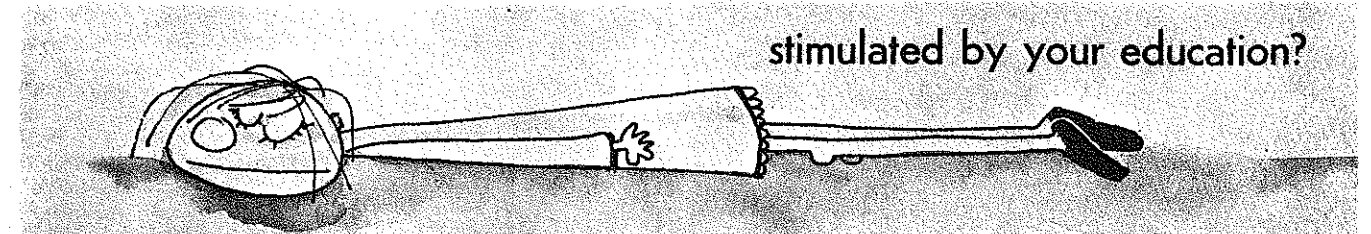

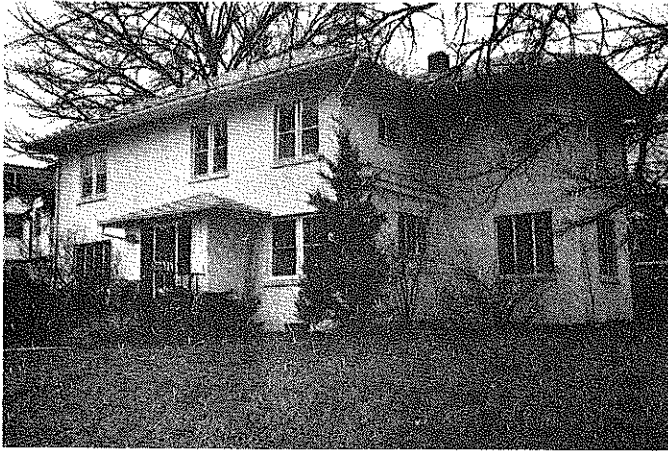
