#### WHO WE ARE

The free university movement began in 1964, at the University of California at Berkeley, as an outgrowth of the Free Speech Movement. Many other free u's sprang up on college campuses across the nation. In response to a need to discuss and learn about social issues, a sense that education should be community-oriented, a belief that education is inherently democratic and the idea that students should have input into their education.

Although free u's began on college campuses, they now serve as bridges between the campus and surrounding community. Free u's attempt to serve all the people in the community - workers, homemakers, farmers, the elderly and children.

The story of University for Man (UFM) is similar. In the fall of 1966, a Kansas State University instructor gathered together some friends to create drama happenings each week. At the same time, a group was meeting in a student's home, exchanging views on society in the year 2000. Together they approached the Kansas State student government and in 1968, printed a brochure, offered seven courses and enrolled about 150 people.

Today UFM is a free university-community education organization which serves Kansas State University, Manhattan, Riley county, and numerous other areas of the State of Kansas. We create and develop all types of educational opportunities which are free of grades, credits, costs and prerequisites. Each spring, summer and fall, UFM prints a catalog, annually offering over 600 courses with about 15,000 enrollments in the Manhattan area. All courses are led by volunteers and are held in informal settings.

UFM has also been instrumental in the establishment of a drug education center, a telephone crisis intervention center, a community food coop, programs for handicapped and elderly citizens, an alternative elementary/junior high school, an appropriate technology center, a community gardens program, and other innovative programs.

#### Funding Sources for Local Programs

UFM Local Programs are supported by: KSU Division of Continuing Education, KSU Student Governing Association, United Way of Riley County, Kansas Farmer's Union-Green Thumb, City of Manhattan, Kansas Department of Education, Office of Adult Education, and the U.S. Office of Education, Vocational Rehabilitation.

#### APPROPRIATE TECHNOLOGY

The Appropriate Technology program will be expanding its activities in 1982. Our Solar Remodeling Program will be holding 4 weekend construction workshops in March and April with two in Manhattan and two in Junction City. These "hands-on" events will be publicized and be open

to those who are interested. Designs and plans will also be available.

With the hiring of an Edible Landscape Horticulturalist in January, we will begin the creation of an energy conserving, food producing landscape at 1221 Thurston. A number of classes in this catalog will be part of the program and provide people with the opportunity to learn skills and techniques that will help them be more self-reliant in food and energy. Look for lots of activity and change in the next six months as we build and plant with the funds from our Department of Energy grant. Appropriate Technology will continue to hold monthly plant sales in the Solar Addition with clients from Big Lakes Developmental Center and the Horticultural Therapy Department, so watch for ads in the local papers. Our Solar Addition has new monitoring equipment so please schedule a tour for your group or drop by during the day and see how simple and effective passive solar really is. Our woodworking co-op has added new equipment and will have a tool kit to lend out for home repairs sometime this spring. So - we look forward to a busy year with you in AT and Energy. #### OUTREACH PROGRAM

UFM Outreach Program began in 1975 with the idea that the successful Manhattan program could also serve small rural communities in Kansas where educational opportunities for adults were limited.

In the intervening years, more than 40 programs have been set up in communities as large as Abilene, population 8,000, and as small as Olsburg, population 170; from Iola in the southeast to Norton in the northwest of Kansas. The programs offer noncredit classes to the general public in which citizens share their ideas, skills and knowledge among themselves.

#### UFM COMMUNITY GARDENS

Wishing for a nice bunch of greens, a truly ripe tomato (one that tastes like a tomato?); trying to remember the smell of sun on a fresh-turned earth? Though the view is wintry, it isn't too soon to begin thinking about your plot in the MANHATTAN COMMUNITY GARDENS.

The average plot size is 400 square feet of space. A sliding scale fee (\$10-\$20) generates income to support the gardens. Land, water, mulch, safe pesticides, tools and horticultural advice are provided by the fee. #### THERE'S AN INVASION HAPPENING

Right now. Right here in Manhattan, Kansas.

They are friends who are here in the Manhattan area to study, to learn and to challenge many of our assumptions. These are our international friends whose presence here is one of the unique features of our community.

We were wondering how the international community sees us - how we, as a community and as a nation appear in their eyes. What are some of their most striking observations?

"People (here) are friendly," observes Betsye Villasante, who has journeyed here from her native Peru with her husband Ronald.

The Villasantes made another interesting observation about Americans in the United States. "There is a need to know about different cultures and the U.S. political system. People here don't care about politics or difficult social problems. People seem to care more in Peru because the problems directly affect so many people."

"The American public needs to be more aware as to what's happening around the world," said Santiago Emmanuel, a Ph.D candidate in Economics at KSU and president of the Phillipino Student Association.

Ghadir Razuki, a KSU sophomore in Business and past president of the Arab Student Association agreed with Emmanuel. "There is a horrendous amount of ignorance apparent as to what is happening beyond Manhattan and in the State of Kansas," said Razuki. "They (Americans) think American life is the standard all the world enjoys... that is just not the case. Sometime that is going to hit you hard in the face."

Razuki also had praise for some aspects he has observed. "American society is by far one of the hardest working. America is very efficiently business oriented...the rest of the world is foolishly jealous."

Dave Sachadeva, KSU Senior in Mechanical Engineering from New Delhi, India also lauds U.S. society on this point. "The United States is unique because of private enterprise. There are more opportunities and opportunities are very important. Government control is a feature of business in India."

But Sachadeva believes that some things have gone "too far." "Materialism is strikingly visible. American society has habits that aren't good for human society." Among the specifics Sachadeva noted are relationships based on material gains and the feat which Americans approach establishing inter-personal relationships because of the shallow bonds of personal concern."

"It's normal to think in terms of your own corn or wheat," said Abdel Abdelrahman, a graduate student in the Grain Science from El Depa Sudan in Northwestern Africa.

"In today's world with our means of communication people are interacting very widely. Things are not separated; things are connected. People complain about the price of corn, the rate of inflation...the price of oil. You can't separate culture, economic and political things from each other."

But thanks to these visitors, the world is not beyond our reach. And we do not even have to travel half-way around the world to discover the what is happening in the international realm, nor need we wait for the critical issues - the arms race, food shortages and political oppression to reach crisis levels. Many courses in this catalog will provide a forum to ask questions and to meet others knowledgable and those seeking knowledge.

We challenge you to discover points beyond the United States this Spring.

These will be only some of the issues explored. Plan now to join us and our invited line-up of nationally known speakers including:






LOU DOUGLAS

Lou Douglas' entire life of 72 years was devoted to serving people. For over 30 years, thousands of students were touched by the wisdom, wit and kindness of this distinguished professor of political science. Lou Douglas' contributions to the political and legislative processes in Kansas are legion. While most of his work was with the Democratic Party, Lou was widely respected and admired by those of all political persuasions.

Lou Douglas was a founding member of the University for Man's Board of Directors, a position he held until his death in 1979. He spent much of his retirement time with the UFM program and provided needed counsel and support which was crucial to the development of UFM's program.

To honor Lou Douglas, the teacher, the leader, the friend, and the democratic spirit Lou inspired in those who knew him, the University for Man inaugurated the Lou Douglas Series last year. The Lou Douglas Series is an annual event which focuses on those issues and concerns to which Lou devoted his life.

UFM offers a variety of photography classes for those who need instruction in darkroom techniques or photography. See the Arts & Crafts Section of the brochure for a listing of classes.





This facility enables co-op members to work on their own woodworking projects, from simple furniture repair to custom designed coffee tables. The shop, although compact, offers room enough for two people to work simultaneously on their projects, which have included stereo cabinets, end tables, bowls and shelving units.

The shop is fully equipped for the woodworking hobbyist or do-it-yourselfer. Stationary power equipment includes a table saw, radial arm saw, jointer, lathe, and bandsaw. A router, drills, belt sander, skill saw and saber saw form a complement of portable power tools. Of course, a full array of hand tools, as well as a sturdy workbench, is also included. The basic stock of tools was provided by a grant from the Clearinghouse for Community Based Free Standing Educational Institutions. While this grant has been exhausted, the stock of tools in the shop is being constantly upgraded and expanded through Co-op member's fees.

The fees for members are \$20.00 per semester, or \$45.00 per year (12 months). The yearly fee is a great savings over the semester fee and enables co-op members to work on their projects uninterrupted.

Because of safety considerations, the Woodshop is available for use by Woodshop Co-op members only. No one-time use is allowed. Hours when the shop is open to members are from 1pm to 10pm weekdays and 9am to 9pm Saturday and Sunday. Members may reserve 4 hours weekly in the shop. Additional shop time is available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

In addition to individual use, the shop is also used for a wide variety of woodworking classes. (See the Skills Section of the brochure.) If you are interested in offering a woodworking class or demonstration in the Spring or would like to take a course not offered this fall, please contact the Woodshop Coordinator.

The Woodshop Coordinator, in addition to teaching woodworking classes and arranging others, is also available to Co-op members for consultation and help on their projects.
