Kansas is full of hidden places. Physically, our landscape appears plain to outsiders because the attractiveness of our state lies in an understated, solid handsomeness, not a gaudy show of mountains, forests, or seashores. Much of our history shares this understated quality. While our past included events of national importance (Bleeding Kansas, the cow town, Carry Nation and prohibition), still most of our history has consisted of events that have not made national headlines.
