## HE FARM CRISIS

"Technology and the Family Farm"was a project funded in part by a grant from the Kansas Committee for the Humanities, an affiliate of The National Endowment for the Humanities. The project was sponsored by UFM.

Kansans who are concerned about farming as a way of life -- not just a way to make a living -- have discussed in four communities how traditional, rural values have been altered by changing technology.

In discussions led by Jan and Cornelia Flora, rural sociologists, KSU, there was an opportunity for the audience to voice concerns, questions, and problems about the changing farm family.

Emphasis was on the individuality and self-sufficiency that is characteristic of farmers, and the gradual changes in the roles of each family member during this century.

Various Kansas ethnic groups and their contributions and influences were discussed. There was also a focus on the depopulation of rural areas, changing work patterns, the impact of technology on the quality of life, rural institutions, and rural women.

One result of this project has been sixteen radio programs. Produced by KSU with the help of Ralph Titus, these five minute programs will be distributed throughout Kansas. The transcripts of these programs are also available for a small fee.

The radio programs deal with the effect of changing technology on the lives of Kansas farmers. Material was gathered in thirty oral interviews by Carl Magnuson, edited by Sheila Carroll, and narrated by Ralph Titus. For more information or to obtain transcripts, please call 1-913-532-5866.

#### TEACHER FEATURE

Jessie Lee Foveaux was born in 1899 and came to Kansas from Missouri when just a girl. Her maternal grandmother taught her to tat when she was nine years old.

Jessie recalls her first efforts produced nothing but knots. Her grandmother said she didn't expect Jessie to be able to do it and that she would teach Jessie's sister instead. With this challenge, Jessie was prompted into action. Jessie took the shuttle under the dining room table and remained there until she could make the stitch. She has been tatting ever since and has taught UFM tatting classes for many years.

Whether it be job search skills, women's self-defense, the meditative practice of Hatha Yoga, concerns with community development, the basics of home buying and investments or continuing the traditional folkarts of the rural Midwest, the curious will find it in the more than 1,000 courses coordinated by UFM annually.

Appropriate Technology: Conserving Our Energy and Resources

The Appropriate Technology Program promotes local self-reliance in the areas of energy, food, shelter, and waste management through classes, seminars, tours, demonstrations and hands-on construction workshops.

#### Outreach: Preserving the Rural Community

Kansans have been struggling with declining populations in rural communities. The Outreach Program provides assistance and support to rural Kansas towns who are attempting to respond to these concerns through community-based education programs. Over 50 Kansas communities have implemented the UFM educational model.

#### The Needs of the Handicapped Adult

Central to UFM's mission has been the concern for the disabled members of our community. UFM has reached out to meet the special needs of this population through Let's ReCreate, a program that provides recreational activities that handicapped adults can learn and integrate into their daily life. Let's ReCreate has been permanently adopted by Manhattan Parks and Recreation Commission and now UFM is extending the model to five rural communities in Kansas.






